## On the Christian Journey... with Pastor Christopher

*“Advent is a season of profound expectation and hope that stubbornly shows up amid very real brokenness.”* Adam Russell Taylor penned that line writing in Sojourners magazine about how watching the World Cup has been a part of his Advent journey, as it has my own. The World Cup in Qatar has been problematic (allegations about bribes, worker exploitation) and beautiful. The world comes together in amazingly wonderful ways at these kinds of events, despite the problems. As I write, the US team was just eliminated from the competition, but did reach the final 16. They frankly exceeded my expectations and I am excited about the next World Cup in 2026, which will be hosted here in North America. Yesterday, the US Senate voted to compel railroad workers to continue working under a contract that provides no sick leave. None. Their work is “too essential to the economy” to allow them to strike for better conditions. Perhaps Qatar is not alone in exploiting workers. I cannot solve any of the above problems, but I can bear witness and I can dream. As I gave myself permission to take some time off, enjoy the World Cup and recenter myself – I have noticed something I’d missed. I’m dreaming again. I’ve had a number of vivid dreams in the last week or so – in my franticness the last few months, I hadn’t noticed that I hadn’t been dreaming, which means I also hadn’t been getting real rest. Dreaming is essential to seeing and dwelling in the sacred. Dreaming is essential to healing brokenness.

Advent is a time of preparation. A time of acknowledging that we are not there yet. A time to dream. To notice and intentionally draw nearer the sacred. Marcia McFee writes *“We too often think that something “sacred” is far away and not available to us. This Advent season, we are “reframing” the way we recognize the sacred reflected all around and through us. As we prepare to move into the world, we begin to reframe our view of the world and our circumstances, illuminating ...the Christ (Anointed One), tangibly present.”* I am blessed to be with you on the journey here in Fort Scott. Thank you for your patience and support.

### Wednesday, December 21<sup>st</sup> 7pm – Longest Night / Blue Christmas.

*The holidays can be difficult – especially if we've lost a loved one or undergone a life change recently. In these times there is much to grieve – the last several years have been tough for all of us and the accumulated trauma of these times – even if we personally haven't suffered much – weighs on us. Especially when we feel like we are supposed to be happy and joyful. This service will create a space to*

*acknowledge these feelings – to engage in the sacred practice of lament and share our burdens. Come lay your burdens on the altar and experience Christ's presence in both joy and sorrow as we seek the light.*

### Saturday, December 24<sup>th</sup>, 7pm – Christmas Eve Service of Carols, Communion and Light

Christmas Eve worship is one of the most cherished traditions. We will gather to share beloved hymns and celebrate the birth of Christ, God with us! Light amidst the darkness, that darkness cannot overcome!

### Sunday, December 25<sup>th</sup>, 10:30am - Special Christmas Day Worship Celebration.

Since Christmas Day falls on a Sunday this year, we will gather at our normal time for a special, interactive service of celebration, joy and thanksgiving.

**Sunday, January 1<sup>st</sup>, 10:30am - New Year's Day Worship Celebration.** We begin a new calendar year even as we are well into the Christian calendar. This again offers us a chance to reflect on our journey, to dream, to seek to live out our faith anew. The early Methodists put great stock in what they called "watch night" services, with the most popular event being Dec. 31<sup>st</sup> to Jan. 1<sup>st</sup>. We will draw on those traditions and proclaim the holy name of Christ as the light enters into the year of our Lord, 2023. We will also provide chalk and instructions to share an ancient tradition:

### Chalking the Doors – an Epiphany Tradition

In Deuteronomy 6:9 God tells the people of Israel: "These words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house... You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."

Chalking the door is a tangible way to honor God in our lives and be intentional about living into God's blessings in the new year. The first and last numbers simply refer to the year – so we'll use 20 and 23. The letters C M B come from the traditional names for the Magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. Alternately, they can stand for "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which in Latin means, "May Christ bless this dwelling!" Join us January 1<sup>st</sup> for more on this practice!


**HOCROC Thank you,**
